Remarks: The Board of Public Works engages a contractor to record and transcribe its meetings. The contractor prepares and provides: (1) audio recordings concurrently with the meeting; and (2) verbatim transcripts soon after. Of critical importance is the contractor's ability to produce, with respect to every Board meeting, a clear, timely audio recording and a high quality, accurate timely transcript. In meeting the challenges of multiple speakers at high-paced meetings, the contractor must act with the highest degree of professionalism and decorum and may not interrupt the Board proceedings.

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3. BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS (continued)

Remarks (continued):

The Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMaryland Marketplace Advantage* (eMMA) for 31 days. eMMA notified 161 vendors and 16 vendors were directly solicited via email, seven of which identified as MBEs. The RFP was designated for the Small Business Reserve (SBR) Program, per the current requirements of the State procurement law, limiting award to only certified small businesses. The incumbent contractor, Hunt Reporting, has serviced this contract for decades but is no longer a certified small business. Therefore, the incumbent was ineligible to compete for this procurement contract award. As there are no meaningful opportunities for Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) or Veteran-owned Small Business Enterprise (VSBE) subcontracting in this contract, the Board office instead focused on maximizing participation by small and minority businesses as the prime contractor by directly soliciting certified MBEs and other certified small businesses.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP. Two proposals were disqualified from consideration after the two offerors failed to respond to "cure letters" identifying multiple material issues with those offerors' proposals. No protests were filed in response to the proposal rejections.

CRC Salomon was the remaining offeror. CRC Salomon's technical proposal was well organized, followed the RFP's instructions and requirements, and demonstrated many years of significant experience providing court reporting/transcription services for Federal, State, and local government entities. CRC Salomon provided thorough information and resumes for its proposed staffing team, and its references provided very positive reviews of CRC Salomon and its services.

Comparing CRC Salomon's financial proposal pricing to the incumbent contractor's current pricing (from the 2021 procurement), as well as the pricing proposed by CRC Salomon in the 2021 procurement for these same services, CRC Salomon's current proposed pricing is less expensive overall than its 2021 proposed rates, as well as the incumbent contractor's current rates, and has been determined to be fair and reasonable.

Based in Baltimore, an award to CRC Salomon would provide significant economic benefits to the State with jobs to Maryland residents and taxes paid to the State. CRC Salomon provides services across the State and in other nearby jurisdictions, and would be able to efficiently staff Board of Public Works meetings in Annapolis. The proposal submitted by CRC Salmon is recommended for award.

The project will form part of a larger mixed-use development that includes a New Cultural Center, an arts and culture complex featuring Toby's Dinner Theater. The development will be financed in two parts using both nine percent and four percent tax credits. The 4% component will consist of 149 LIHTC units serving family and special-needs households earning between 20% and 80% of Area Median Income (AMI). The project is sponsored by Howard County Housing Commission.

The project was advertised on both eMaryland Marketplace and the MES Bonfire website.

MSLA's County Library Capital Project Grant Program makes capital grants to county public library systems to support projects that address the State's library needs. The grants must be matched according to a wealth-based cost sharing formula (implemented June 1, 2013) and must be at least \$20,000. During the 2021 General Session, the annual funding mandate for the program was increased from \$5,000,000 to \$7,500,000.

Remarks: Constructed 1854-1859, the First and Franklin Presbyterian Church is the original congregation of the Presbyterians in Baltimore. The church is a high-style and notable example of Gothic Revival architecture. In 1873, the spires were added to the building. Funding will support critical masonry repairs the south and east facades of the building.

Remarks: Cowdensville A.M.E. Church is a frame and shingled church with a gabled roof, in vernacular style, and was constructed between 1904 and 1907. A complete rehabilitation was undertaken in the late 1990s to save the church from condemnation and demolition. Funding will support exterior rehabilitation, including framing, siding, and masonry repairs, and protective measures from potential automobile damage.

Remarks: Constructed in 1891, the Patterson Park Observatory was designed by Charles Latrobe at the northwestern edge of Patterson Park (MIHP B-4607, NRHP) in East Baltimore, which was established as a "Public Walk" and donated to the City by William Patterson in 1827. The octagonal structure was designed like a pagoda with four stories, each with a different window design and decorative balcony. The exotic style of the observatory drew from the Picturesque movement, which remained popular in park architecture into the end of the nineteenth century. Funding will support the rehabilitation of the roof.

It is significant for its association with early Scandinavian settlement in Maryland and as the mid-Atlantic's northernmost navigable inland waterway. The house is currently used for historical interpretation and fundraising activities, although limited due to its condition. Funding will support an engineering study.

Remarks: The ca. 1875 Girdletree Methodist Church, constructed in the vernacular Gothic Revival style, displays wood siding, dentiled cornice, quatrefoil and trifoil detailing at front gable end, and a unique cross-braced bell tower and spire. Originally a Methodist Episcopal Church, the building is now home to the Girdletree Church Museum and hosts tours, weddings, and other events throughout the year. Funding will support interior and exterior rehabilitation.

The building is currently home to the Michael Cresap Museum. Funding will support interior and exterior rehabilitation.

Remarks: The Old Otterbein Church/Old Otterbein Evangelical United Brethren Church was constructed in 1785 and is a two-story brick Georgian structure. There was a major remodeling in 1839, however, much of the original glass still remains as well as the bells, cast in Germany and installed in 1789. It is the only continuously used 18th-century church building in the city of Baltimore and held the first Conference of United Brethren preachers, resulting in the official organization of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ. Funding will support interior and exterior rehabilitation.

Remarks: Tudor Hall is a ca. 1795, two-story, brick-clad, five-bay residence that is the earliest extant private structure in Leonardtown. The original gabled building was flanked by one-story wings that were later raised to the height of the central block, and the roof was replaced with a hipped roof in the early 19th century. Four interior chimneys represent the envelope of the original main block. Stucco parging that was applied during the 19th century has since been removed. The building is currently home to the St. Mary's Historical Society. Funding will support interior and exterior rehabilitation.

Remarks: The Kent News Building is a ca. 1859, two-story, three-bay by four-bay, front-gabled, brick-clad building that originally housed the Methodist Protestant Church. By 1904, the building had been transferred to the Enterprise Newspaper, and later, in 1949, to the Kent Publishing Company. The property is now used by the Sultana Education Center. Funding will support exterior masonry and wood repairs.

Several partially submerged steel icebreakers that date to the first construction of the lighthouse are located within 30 yards of the lighthouse. It is the only intact cottage-style lighthouse in its original location still used as an aid to navigation today. Funding will support the repair of the historic icebreakers.

Description: Interior and exterior rehabilitation including stabilization; site work; selective demolition; flooring repair / replacement; roofing repair; masonry; foundation repair; and associated architectural, engineering, and consulting services. [Total project costs \$100,000.00 estimated.]

Remarks: Customs House, located in the Chestertown Historic District, is more than 275 years old and has what is believed to be an underground holding cell for enslaved people, which is one of the few surviving architectural features associated with the trans-Atlantic slave trade. The Customs House hosts public events and will continue to do so by expanding their community engagements to educate the public on local African American history. Funding will support interior and exterior rehabilitation.

DPSCS facility maintenance staff attempted to modulate the heat and pressure within the system to restore hot water to the entire facility but were unsuccessful. It was determined that a contractor with specialized expertise and equipment would be required to fully repair the steam leak.

The contractor shall provide all labor, equipment, supervision, and rental services necessary to investigate and repair the major steam leak at the JCI Sally Port entrance. Services include conditioning the manhole for investigation, developing a repair plan, and notifying JCI staff whether repairs can be completed within the manhole or if excavation is required. If excavation is needed, a temporary steam line shall be installed to restore steam service as soon as possible. Upon completion, all disturbed ground areas shall be seeded and strawed, and asphalt shall be repaired.

Basis for Selection: To remain competitive, calls for quotes were made to two vendors. Both vendors contacted had prior experience performing comparable mechanical repair work at DPSCS's correctional facilities. PMC, a Certified Small Business (CSB), was selected due to their immediate availability and ability to quickly respond and address the emergency condition. Maryland Mechanical was contacted but did not respond at the time of the emergency.

Requesting Agency Remarks: The MAA seeks approval of a retroactive lease contract to establish a new five-year lease with FAA.

This is a federal government contract in which MAA is dependent upon the FAA's processes for development, preparation, and execution to finalize the contract. MAA requested the contract from FAA in May 2024 to allow sufficient time to obtain BPW approval prior to the original expiration date of March 31, 2025. MAA made several follow-up attempts regarding the new contract; however, the FAA did not respond until December 2024, at which time FAA requested additional financial information. As a result, FAA prepared a Supplement extending the existing contract for an additional nine months. The Supplement was approved by BPW as Item 4-GM-MOD on March 19, 2025. The FAA subsequently provided a draft contract to MAA in July 2025. Due to the government shutdown and unforeseen delays beyond MAA's control, the final contract was not received from FAA until May 2026. Accordingly, this resulted in a retroactive lease agreement between the MAA and FAA. MAA will invoice FAA the difference between the holdover rates and the new rates.

This lease contract continues to provide for the lease of space to support the air traffic control operations at BWI Marshall Airport.

This type of revenue-producing contract at a transportation facility is outside the scope of the State Procurement Law (State Finance and Procurement Article §11-202(3); COMAR 21.01.03.03.B(1)(d). However, the contract and any modifications must be approved by the BPW because the contract constitutes a lease and use of State Property under State Finance and Procurement Article, §10-305.

Requesting Agency Remarks: On January 16, 2026, MPA advertised the Multi-Step Invitation for Bids (MS-IFB) as a Small Business Reserve contract on eMaryland Marketplace Advantage (eMMA) which notified approximately 1759 vendors of the solicitation. A pre-bid meeting was held on January 23, 2026. Six contractors from three firms attended the pre-bid meeting. MPA received one responsive bid.

The work under this Contract consist of general building repairs, such as metal siding and roof panel replacement, gutter and downspout repairs, overhead door repair and/or replacement, cold rolled steel windows, flashing repair, steel beam and column repairs, concrete/masonry rehabilitation, protective buildings bollards, prefabricated metal roof systems, insulation, exterior roof access ladder installation and metal building roof coating; IT, communications and building systems; commercial and industrial facilities; dry pipe sprinkler systems; mechanical systems; electrical systems; associated site, civil and hardscape work. The following work orders are anticipated to be issued after contract award: South Locust Point (SLP) Shed 11D Gutter and Downspout Replacement; Dunmar Bldg. After the technical review was complete and the bidder's technical offer was found to be acceptable, the public bid opening was conducted and evaluated according to MS-IFB Section 5.3. The evaluated total bid is the sum of all line items used to establish pricing of certain items which were most likely to be utilized on work orders issued under the contract. The total price does not set the not-to-exceed value of the contract. The not-to-exceed value is based on the approved budget for this contract.

As it was a single bid received, a line-item review was conducted by the Procurement Officer and the Project Manager from the Engineering department. As Baltimore Contractors was the incumbent on the contract, line-item pricing remained consistent with previous pricing and a reasonable increase to account for inflation. Baltimore Contractors' line-item pricing has been determined to be fair and reasonable.

Due to the lack of bids received, the Procurement Officer attempted to directly contact over 30 vendors that were notified of the solicitation to inquire why they chose not to submit a bid. A limited response was received. One contractor stated it was due to lack of experience in commodities required and the other was that the scope was beyond their current capacity. The Procurement Officer has determined that other prospective bidders had reasonable opportunity to respond to this solicitation.

Requesting Agency Remarks (cont'd): The work to be performed under this Contract consists of the construction of a storm drain system. Generally, the proposed storm drain system will capture and convey the surface runoff from the Masonville Dredge Material Containment Facility slopes and the landlocked area in the Kurt Iron Slip (KIS) and connect to the existing storm drain system servicing Fairfield Marine Terminal. Furthermore, a downstream bypass pipe will be installed to provide relief to the existing system and mitigate flooding conditions at the terminal. The new storm drain addition will add approximately 1600 linear feet of storm drain and will affect approximately 12.23 acres.

Allan Myers's technical proposal was deemed to be excellent by the evaluation committee. Allan Myers provided a strong understanding of the scope of work and demonstrated a comprehensive understanding of the MPA's requirements. Allan Myers's technical proposal included a project team with extensive experience, including MPA experience. The approach was well written and clearly specified the work that would be self-performed and subcontracted. The projects listed showing their experience have a direct correlation to the work expected to be completed at Fairfield Marine Terminal.

After technically ranking the firms, Price Proposals were opened, all of which were significantly higher than the Engineer's Estimate. To better assess the discrepancy, a price breakdown on certain line items were requested from the Offerors. After review of the breakdowns, a Best and Final Offer was requested.

Financially, Allan Myers was the lowest offer with a price proposal of \$6,548,000.00, which was 27.5% over the engineer's estimate of \$5,134,420.00. The BAFO process resulted in only limited overall changes to the submitted original offers. While certain bid items were adjusted, the majority of changes reflected redistribution of costs within the bid schedules rather than meaningful refinement of scope assumptions or reduction of risk. Front-end items such as Mobilization, Maintenance of Traffic, and Health & Safety were used as vehicles for front end cost loading, indicating a perception of risk across all Offerors. Allan Myers' proposal remained the most consistent and technically grounded, with no material indication of scope misinterpretation. Although some front-end cost loading persists, their bid reflects a clear understanding of the work.

*The DBE goal was zeroed out to be consistent with the Interim Final Rule issued by the United States Department of Transportation on October 3, 2025. No VSBE goal was established for this contract.

On October 17, 2018, the Board of Public Works approved Contract No. LR-18-005-IT, a sole-source contract wherein XenaTech Software Integration Services, LLC provided services to support and maintain the Light Rail Next Train Arrival (NTA) software system. The NTA system provides real-time train arrival information through platform LED signs, a mobile website, a desktop website, and a secure maintenance portal for yard mapping and on-time performance monitoring.

A 12-month extension was executed on November 1, 2023, extending the expiration date to October 31, 2024. A seven-month extension was executed on October 25, 2024, extending the contract expiration date to May 31, 2025, while the MTA prepared to procure the replacement contract. Unfortunately, the contract expired on May 31, 2025, before a procurement for the replacement contract could be completed, due to scope changes that had to be incorporated and negotiated into the new contract. Drafting and finalizing the necessary scope changes caused a delay in finalizing the procurement process for the replacement contract before the current contract expired. XenaTech continued to provide critical services to support and maintain the Light Rail NTA software system following the contract expiration date.

Per BPW Advisory 2016-1, a fair and reasonable price analysis was conducted to compare XenaTech's retro-active and proactive total contract price of \$213,894.60 with the historical pricing of the 2018 contract. The analysis confirmed that the monthly rates for the core services, Web Hosting (\$3,570.56) and Reporting (\$7,818.90), remain unchanged from the final year of the previous contract. Therefore, the proposed contract value does not reflect an increase in the underlying service rates and is attributable solely to the addition of the NetCloud subscription. The inclusion of this service represents an increase of less than one percent of the overall value.

A properly functioning NTA system is essential for maintaining accurate real-time train arrival information for passengers and supporting Light Rail Operations' ability to monitor system

performance. It is vital for MTA Light Rail Operations to monitor the health of the NTA system installed on each train. Light Rail Operations relies on Application Programming

This contract provides an essential service to the MTA, as server and train data feeds, website hosting services, and provide data that the traveling public relies on daily and support inclusive ridership. Failure to ratify this retroactive contract would result in the loss of real-time arrival information due to the inability to broadcast data to station LED display signs, causing degraded customer service and diminished operational oversight.

MTA's Office of Internal Audits conducts internal audits (including information technology), special reviews, investigations, and consulting engagements. To address the need for audit staffing resources, specialized IT audit knowledge, and an increase in special investigations, MTA utilized an MDOT contract that was established by the State Highway Administration (SHA). The SHA contract expired on January 8, 2026 and a new contract was required to complete investigations and audit engagements that had been initiated. The ongoing audits were included in the annual audit plan required per Executive Order 01.01.1994.06, while special reviews and investigations include work related to mandatory reporting under COMAR 11.02.08.01, applicable Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBAs), and the Governor's Executive Order 01.01.2023.01 regarding employee misconduct, respectively.

On January 9, 2026, the MTA established a sole-source bridge contract with SC&H Attest Services, P.C., to provide internal audit support for ongoing audits, special reviews, and investigations while a procurement for a replacement contract was underway; however, the successor contract was delayed due to the MTA planning for the audit services to be procured under a larger MTA-wide audit services contract. After further consideration, it was determined that audit and investigative services for the Office of Audits would be procured under a separate contract to maintain strict objectivity. It is critical for MTA to maintain these essential services, as any interruption could adversely affect mandatory audit reporting and disciplinary actions and may result in external audit findings. The increased contract authority will allow the MTA Office of Audits to continue audit activities currently underway and ensure that reviews are completed within the allowable timeframe.

The apparent low bidder's bid, who is also the incumbent, was rejected. SHA conducted a review of the Equipment and Experience Statement (EES). During the review the apparent low bidder agreed to submit a rental agreement for the lease of a Traffic Mounted Attenuator as required by contract by February 25, 2026. As of February 27, 2026, no response or communication was received by SHA and as a result, SHA rejected the bid on March 2, 2026. SHA then moved on to the second bidder.

The State Highway Administration (SHA) directly solicited 11 contractors. Maryland Works granted a waiver for these services on February 12, 2025. SHA received three bids which were opened on January 08, 2026. The incumbent did not bid because they missed the solicitation deadline. There were no protests filed for this contract.

The apparent low bidder –withdrew their bid on February 19, 2026. The bid appeared to have a mistake which was clear on the face of the bid documents. SHA asked the firm to confirm their bid and was told that the firm had committed a data/clerical mistake by erroneously entering the incorrect bid on Items 7002, 7005, 7004, and 7006. Based on SHA's review of the bid results and a request, made by the firm, dated February 12, 2026, SHA determined that the bid submitted for this contract was withdrawn pursuant to COMAR 21.05.02.12C(2).

The second lowest bidder was rejected on March 24, 2026. In an attempt to obtain more information, SHA reached out to the firm several times via phone and emails to discuss its pricing and schedule an inspection of their equipment but they did not provide a response or a reason for the delay as of March 21, 2026. SHA rejected the bid and determined that it is a non-responsible bidder in accordance with COMAR 21.06.01.01B(1).

SHA subsequently moved on to the third bidder.

This contract is to respond to Hand Mowing, Trimming and Litter Pickup at Various Locations West of Bel Air in Harford County. The single responsive bid of \$326,650.00 submitted by the Contractor – Manuel Landscaping, Inc is justifiable and based on our analysis against the Engineer's Estimate. The Engineer's Estimate did reflect the average cost for this operation, however after speaking to the contractor about their bid prices for items in category 7 (7001 & 7003) it was determined that the Engineer's Estimate underestimated the true cost to perform this work by a contractor. The increases were mainly due to the general increases in material and labor costs. An analysis of the major difference between the low bid and the Engineer's Estimate was performed. There were two -line items that were significant for the variation from the Engineer's Estimates. These items had major individual cost overruns and combined, they totaled \$309,120.00, accounting for 67.81% of the total difference between the Engineer's estimate and the bid. Therefore, the prices submitted by the contractor reflect a fair market value and are competitive for performing the operations.

Requesting Agency Remarks: The Phase 1 solicitation for the above-referenced Project was advertised on eMaryland Marketplace Advantage on October 29, 2025. Nine (9) offerors submitted technical proposals, all of which were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award and were evaluated as responsive. The Evaluation Committee commenced technical proposal evaluations on February 3, 2026. Oral presentations were conducted from March 11, 2026, through March 13, 2026, as part of the evaluation process. Financial proposals were opened on March 31, 2026, and Best and Final Offers (BAFOs) were requested on April 1, 2026, to refine pricing and support the final evaluation process. A final Evaluation Committee meeting was held on April 8, 2026, during which the committee members' evaluations were reviewed and certified.

Overall rankings were determined using the weighted evaluation criteria established in the solicitation, with technical factors receiving greater weight than financial factors. Because the CMAR delivery method anticipates negotiation of future Phase 2 construction services with the selected contractor, the evaluation also considered the anticipated long-term financial impact to the State associated with each offeror's proposed fee structure. Financial rankings were developed using a normalized cost analysis methodology evaluating both the Phase 1 Preconstruction Services costs and anticipated Phase 2 costs to assess the projected long-term financial impact to the State. Because DGS anticipates negotiating and awarding Phase 2 services to the selected CMAR contractor, the evaluation considered the total projected cost of both phases rather than Phase 1 pricing alone.

The Phase 2 pricing components were evaluated for comparative ranking purposes only and do not constitute authorization for Phase 2 services, which remain subject to future negotiation, funding, and applicable approvals.

For evaluation purposes, all offerors were assessed using the same assumed project conditions. The Phase 2 General Conditions Fee for Construction Phase Services was calculated using each offeror's proposed monthly rate multiplied by an assumed forty (40) month construction duration. The proposed Construction Management (CM) Fee percentages were also applied against an assumed Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) construction value of \$50,000,000 for comparative evaluation purposes only. These standardized assumptions allowed the State to compare all fee proposals on an equal basis and evaluate the anticipated total project cost associated with each offeror's proposed fee structure.

Agency Remarks(cont'd):

The resulting financial analysis demonstrated meaningful differences in the offerors' proposed long-term fee structures and projected total costs. While James G. Davis Construction Corporation submitted the lowest evaluated financial proposal and received the highest financial ranking, the solicitation established that technical factors would receive greater weight than financial factors in determining the overall rankings.

Upon completion of the technical and financial evaluations, Consigli Construction Co., Inc. achieved the highest overall ranking based on the combined weighted evaluation criteria. Although Consigli ranked second technically and third financially, the Evaluation Committee and

Procurement Officer determined that the proposal represented the most advantageous value to the State based on the overall balance of technical qualifications, project approach, staffing, experience, and competitive pricing. The proposal demonstrated a strong combination of technical capability and cost competitiveness when evaluated against the solicitation's weighted criteria.

Phase 1 of the Project does not include a Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) participation goal or a Veteran-Owned Small Business Enterprise (VSBE) participation goal. For Phase 2 Construction Services, the anticipated participation goals are forty percent (40%) MBE participation, including subgoals of eleven percent (11%) for Women-Owned Business Enterprises and eight percent (8%) for African American-Owned Business Enterprises, and five percent (5%) VSBE participation. Phase 2 services may be negotiated and awarded at a later date in accordance with the contract terms and applicable approvals.

Requesting Agency Remarks: The Request for Proposals (RFP) for this revenue-generating contract was published on eMaryland Marketplace Advantage (eMMA) in accordance with COMAR Title 21. The solicitation remained open for approximately 45 days to promote competition and vendor participation. In addition to the eMMA posting, the solicitation was directly distributed to 101 vendors to encourage participation from qualified firms.

Proposals were due on February 26, 2026, and three proposals were received in response to the solicitation. [...] All proposals were determined to be [...] reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. Technical evaluations, including oral presentations, were conducted in accordance with the RFP evaluation criteria. CBRE, Inc. was ranked overall number one with [...] the highest ranked technical offer based on its demonstrated experience supporting large public-sector real estate portfolios, comprehensive staffing approach, market analysis capabilities, and strategic planning methodology aligned with the operational needs of [...] Department of General Services - Office of Real Estate (DGS ORE) and the highest ranked financial offer with the highest Total Evaluated Price based upon the formula used to evaluate both the rebate percentages based on the total rebate dollars and the hourly rates for consulting services over the potential five-year contract. Therefore, CBRE, Inc.'s proposal is determined to be the most advantageous to the State,

considering the price and technical factors set forth in the RFP, and is recommended for contract award.

The contractor compensation was calculated by: (1) forecasting the expiring leases for the 3- year base term and the 2-year renewal option period; (2) estimating future rent to be negotiated for these leases; and (3) applying the industry standard broker commission amount of 4% for years 1 - 5 and 2% for years 6 - 10 for these leases. This information was provided to each offeror for use in preparing and submitting their financial proposals, in which they committed to pay DGS a certain percentage of the commission as a rebate fee.

The estimate of future rent was factored in based on the size and location of each lease. It should be noted that the contractor compensation is based on real estate commissions paid by commercial landlords and is not a pass-through fee to the broker. It is a contractual obligation of the landlord under the DGS lease to pay the DGS broker. DGS does not receive the rebate fee until the landlord has paid the commission to the broker, and the broker remits the agreed-upon rebate fee to DGS.

The solicitation established a 35% Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) participation goal and no Veteran-Owned Small Business Enterprise (VSBE) participation goal. CBRE, Inc. proposed meeting the established MBE participation requirements set forth in the solicitation.

Requesting Agency Remarks: A Request for Proposal was advertised on eMaryland Marketplace Advantage (eMMA) on December 31, 2025. A total of 13 potential contractors were also directly solicited. Seven proposals were received, and two were determined to be reasonably susceptible to being selected for award. Five were deemed not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award because their technical proposals did not meet the minimum technical proposal evaluation score. The recommended offeror, KPMG LLP, was determined to be most advantageous to the State, as its proposal ranked highest technically and was lowest in price.

In the solicitation, it was specified that the bid structure established for this solicitation was the HSCRC budgeted four million five hundred thousand dollars (\$4,500,000.00) for this contract over the three (3) year contract term. As the amount and timing of services are to be determined, the contract award for this solicitation was set with no commitment by the State to incur the full amount. As the total contract amount is a fixed indefinite quantity cost, the offeror's financial proposals were evaluated based on a comparison of hourly rates for various categories of staff across a hypothetical distribution of 1,000 hours.

KPMG's proposal was superior, as they have a deep understanding of the work and provided responses to the scope of work that supported their understanding of the financial policy reviews/HSCRC policies/benchmarking, as well as the work and process that would support this project. They have experienced staff with relevant experience, specifically in Maryland. They are best qualified to understand HSCRC industry specifics, including Maryland reimbursement, annual filing, and other data availability, as well as policies that may impact financial policy applications. Additionally, KPMG's proposal offered a complete team with a wide range of expertise, strong national experience with the HSCRC financial policy review, and experience with rate setting and other HSCRC functions.

Requesting Agency Remarks: Latham Centers, Inc. provides therapeutic, residential, educational, and vocational services. Latham provides specialized services for children with intellectual disabilities, as well as one or more of the following diagnoses: Prader-Willi syndrome; autism spectrum disorders; non-verbal learning disability; and/or mental health diagnosis including RAD, PTSD, anxiety disorder; or depressive/mood disorder. Latham accepts male and female youth from ages 8-21.

It is in the best interest of the State to approve this contract as it will enable DHS to continue to deliver the support and placement services that this contract provides. DHS entered into a Small Procurement Contract with Latham Centers to meet the specialized needs of one youth who was placed on April 14, 2025.



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28-S. SERVICES CONTRACT (cont'd)

Agency Remarks (cont'd):

The youth was placed with the provider because all Maryland in-state residential resources have been exhausted. Prior to being placed out-of-state at Latham Center, Inc., the Maryland youth was referred to six in-state providers and was either non-responsive or denied due to inability to care for youth with unique specialized diagnosis (Prader-Willi Syndrome).

Prior to any decision to contract with a provider or place a youth, DHS conducts a comprehensive Google search to identify any reported incidents, adverse media, or other publicly available information that could indicate concerns related to the safety and well-being of youth or the provider's past performance. In addition, licensure information is verified with the state responsible for licensing the provider to confirm that the license is current and in good standing. No concerns were identified through these reviews. DHS's Contracts and Performance Monitoring Unit also completed a pre-placement site inspection, to ensure compliance with applicable COMAR regulations and to verify the provider's capacity to deliver required services. Based on these findings, the provider was approved to be a contracted residential provider to serve youth in the care and custody of the Department of Human Services.

With the following placement at Latham Centers, Inc. the Local Department social worker conducts monthly meetings for the youth to assess progress and ongoing treatment needs. These treatment team meetings review social, behavioral, and medical factors to evaluate placement stability and readiness for transition to a least restrictive placement provider when appropriate. In addition, the Local Department social worker and the assigned contract administrator conduct quarterly on-site or virtual visits to assess youth safety, well-being, and provider performance, including follow-up on any surveys, audits, or identified concerns. Any safety concerns or serious reportable incidents involving a Maryland youth are reported within 24 hours to the Local Department social worker, contract administrator, and family or guardian and are investigated in accordance with SSA policy.

To increase in-state capacity for youth with complex behavioral and medical needs, has issued a Statement of Need (SON) to allow providers to obtain a license and/or expand their current license to serve youth in various programs that will support youth with complex behavioral and mental health needs. The responses to the SON are under review for licensure purposes. Through monthly meetings with the provider community, SSA is focused on provider retention, service expansion, and the development of clinical step-down options to safely transition youth back to Maryland from higher levels of care.

Agency Remarks (cont'd):

This out-of-state provider is able to clinically address the youth's specialized needs, with plans to transition the youth to a less restrictive placement when clinically appropriate. Provider performance and regulatory compliance are overseen by the State of Massachusetts and SSA's Contracts and Performance Monitoring and Placement Units. Since becoming a contracted Maryland provider, Latham has undergone quarterly monitoring, with no concerns identified during the July 11, 2025, and December 23, 2025, and May 14, 2026 reviews. Continuation of this contract ensures youth receive necessary care and support, including development of Activities of Daily Living skills, while in-state Maryland capacity is expanded to support their return.

MBE or VSBE participation goals were established for this contract since the specialized core services (psychiatric services/evaluations, case management, therapy, recreational therapeutic programs, educational services etc.) are available within the facility and require specialized training, certification, and clearances.

Requesting Agency Remarks:

The Financial Regulation (FinReg) Division uses contracts for specialty services (“Specialty Contracts”). These services are not paid for or billed to the State or the MIA. Instead, they are paid directly by the insurance company being examined in accordance with Section 2-208 of the Maryland Insurance Article. The original Specialty Contracts approved by BPW covered the five-year period from September 6, 2018, to September 5, 2023, and had no renewal option. However, MIA executed the contract in FMIS as a three-year Contract from 9/6/2018 to 9/5/2021, with a two-year- one-year renewal option. The Contract expired in FMIS on September 5, 2021, and the two-year option was neither exercised nor a new solicitation initiated due to administrative oversight.

The Contractors continued to provide services to the Financial Regulation (FinReg) Division in good faith, relying on the expired contracts. Although these services are not paid for or billed to the State or the MIA, they are paid directly by the insurance company being examined in accordance with Section 2-208 of the Maryland Insurance Article.

The Financial Regulation (FinReg) Division has continued to use the specialty services (“Specialty Contracts”) to date due to the time required to complete and award a new Contract to avoid having lapses in examinations that ensure the continued financial solvency of insurers authorized to do business in Maryland, detect solvency issues in advance, and ensure compliance with National Association of Insurance Commissioners requirements and Maryland law. A requisition and SOW to initiate a new solicitation for Specialty Financial Examination Services were not submitted to Procurement until April 15, 2025.

The MIA is mandated by Section § 2-205 of the Insurance Article of the Maryland Annotated Code to conduct financial examinations of insurance companies, health maintenance organizations, and managed care organizations at least once every five years. These examinations are intended to ensure the continued financial solvency of insurers authorized to do business in Maryland by detecting solvency issues in advance and ensuring compliance with National Association of Insurance Commissioners requirements and Maryland law.

The passage of this legislation was expected to significantly increase the number of claims submitted for reimbursement to the Trauma Fund, underscoring the critical need for robust and financially stable TPA services.

Requesting Agency Remarks: The Department of Service and Civic Innovation (DSCI) utilizes Infojini, Inc. as Employer of Record (EOR) for members participating in the Maryland Corps and Service Year Option programs.

Under this arrangement, Infojini, Inc. ;Infojini administers payroll processing, tax withholding, onboarding documentation, and other employment related services required to ensure compliance with federal and State employment laws.

The majority of the contract value represents pass through wages paid directly to program members. A smaller administrative fee is retained by the contractor for payroll processing and compliance services.

The contract was originally awarded using an Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement (ICPA) under COMAR 21.05.09 through the Equalis Group cooperative contract vehicle. This procurement method allowed DSCI to leverage competitively awarded pricing and terms while implementing services within a compressed program launch timeline.

This modification extends the contract term to ensure continuity of payroll and employer of record services for new program members for the cohort starting in August 2026. Failure to extend the contract and increase the not-to-exceed contract amount would negatively impact program operations and member support as it would decrease the number of host site partners and corresponding members that could participate in the program.

The contractor has performed satisfactorily and continues to provide critical payroll and compliance services necessary to administer the State's growing service program.

The existing contract with IBM for this service is \$6,283,738.19 and the new contract cost is \$7,030,292.34, an increase of an average of 5.9% per contract year. This is less than the current CPI of 6.79% for Information Technology, Hardware and Services. COM has determined this price to be fair and reasonable.

To support that effort, the ADC obtains and manages licenses and maintenance services for numerous mainframe software products including SAS products. SAS provides the use and maintenance for Base SAS, SAS Graph and SAS/ETS. The software serves as analytical tools, allowing programmers to read, format, analyze and report on data quickly, regardless of format. SAS is the sole manufacturer, publisher, and source of SAS® software in the United States and is the only vendor that can license and maintain the mainframe software and provide support services.

The price has been determined to be fair and reasonable. COM is currently on a legacy pricing schedule that no longer exists for new customers, so they do not have a customer who is a match for a pricing comparison. However, pricing for this license as a new customer would be \$289,800. This software is not available on a GSA contract for comparison. Past pricing for this contract was FY24-\$174,868.15 (3% increase), FY25-\$180,114.19 (3% increase), and FY26-\$186,419 (3.5% increase). The price for FY27 is an increase of 3.5%.

MSDE compared the proposed pricing against the prior contract period rates and evaluated the year-over-year escalation. An initial joint scope of work walkthrough was prepared on March 4, 2025 and was subsequently revised to incorporate architectural requirements and applicable regulations associated with the historic nature of this site. Multiple coordination meetings were held with land use and government partners in Historic St. Mary's City to review and obtain approval for watershed activities within this historically sensitive area resulting in refinement of the scope of work. Also incorporated into the scope of work are specifications for aggregate and landscaping supplies that comply with the Green Purchasing Checklist for Construction and A/E Services prepared by the Green Purchasing Committee. A final proposal in the amount of \$821,540.00 was received on 9/24/2025. The increase in cost from the original estimate is primarily attributable to revisions required to address those standards outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding between the Historic St. Mary's City Commission and the Critical Area Commission for the Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays.

Requesting Agency Remarks: Healthbridge Children's Hospital-Houston LTD/Nexus Children's Hospital Houston provides treatment for Behavioral challenges and co-occurring medical needs. All needs are addressed in a comprehensive, integrated way, which is important for overall wellbeing. Healthbridge Children's Hospital created a medical-model residential treatment center that's intentionally different. Residents in their care can expect their physical, mental, and behavioral health challenges to be addressed simultaneously. Healthbridge is also nationally known to treat childhood obesity and the weight and behavioral issues of Prader-Willi Syndrome (PWS) and provide a full continuum of care for children, youth, and adults who are overcoming emotional, behavioral, or developmental challenges associated with PWS, Type II diabetes and associated complications age ranging from 13-18 years old.

Agency Remarks (cont'd):

It is in the best interest of the State to approve this contract as it will enable DHS to continue to deliver the support and services that this contract provides. Healthbridge provides services to meet the specialized needs of one youth currently placed with the provider and one youth pending. These youth have been placed with and/or referred to the provider because all Maryland in-state residential resources have been exhausted. Prior to being placed out of state at Healthbridge, Youth #1 was referred to seven in-State providers over a two-month period and was denied due to the level of care for treatment and safety needed. Youth #2 was referred to five in-State providers over a six-month period and was denied due to the youths' age, and the level of educational and psychological needs.

Prior to the decision to contract with Healthbridge, the Department reviewed and retrieved past performance of the provider and to evaluate safety concerns that would prohibit the state of Maryland from contracting with Healthbridge. There were no concerns identified. The State of Maryland Contracts and Performance Monitoring unit also completed a Pre-Placement Site Inspection to determine if Healthbridge was able to provide the services that our Maryland youth require in compliance with the standard regulations set forth by COMAR. Healthbridge was approved to be a State of Maryland contracted residential provider.

Once youth are placed with Healthbridge, the Local Department Social Worker conducts monthly meetings with them to evaluate the progress of youths since being placed. These treatment team meetings discuss social, behavioral, and medical aspects of each youth's placement to determine their progress or lack thereof, and their readiness to be considered for re-entry with a residential in-state Maryland provider. The Local Department Social Workers also visit the youths quarterly, as does the assigned contract administrator, at which time the progress and safety of the youth is evaluated as well as the performance of the provider. During these quarterly meetings the contract administrators follow up to find out if there have been any jurisdictional surveys, audits, or safety concerns identified during the quarter. Safety concerns and serious reportable incidents that occur relative to our Maryland youth are reported to the Local Department social worker, the contract administrator, as well as the family/guardian within a 24-hour period, at which point these matters are investigated as required.

In partnership with the Maryland Department of Health and the Department of Juvenile Services, the Department is building and strengthening partnerships with MRPA and businesses interested in supporting youth in need of placement services in Maryland. SSA also meets with the provider community monthly to work on retention and to support clinical step-down options to bring youth back to Maryland who need a higher level of care.

Agency Remarks (cont'd):

Since becoming a contracted Maryland provider, Healthbridge has been monitored on a quarterly basis. The fourth quarter 2025 monitoring occurred November 7, 2025, and there were no concerns. This contract will allow these youth to continue to receive the necessary care and support that they need as they work to improve their Activities of Daily Living Skills in preparation for their return to Maryland once in-state resources become available.

This Out-of-State Provider can clinically address the specialized needs of the youth and when clinically appropriate the youth will be stepped down to a less restrictive placement. The Provider's performance and compliance is reviewed by the State of Pennsylvania and SSA Contract and Placement Units.

No MBE or VSBE participation goals were established for this contract since the specialized core services (psychiatric services/evaluations, case management, therapy, recreational therapeutic programs, educational services etc.) are available within the facility and require specialized training, certification, and clearances.

Maryland rates are set to ensure equal rates are paid for equal services regardless of the placing agency, placing State, or location of the facility. All rates issued by Maryland must comply with all cost approval guidelines and instructions.

The Orijin educational platform is currently utilized across the Maryland Department of Labor's (DOL) correctional education programs within DPSCS facilities.

Agency Remarks (cont'd):

The Orijin platform is a proprietary, corrections-safe Learning Management System (LMS) and user management portal that enables DPSCS to securely deliver education, rehabilitation, and reentry programming across multiple secure devices. The system supports personalized learning plans, intake auto-provisioning, digital courseware, interactive instruction, real-time progress monitoring, and robust reporting tools that meet State and Federal requirements for tracking higher education outcomes. By standardizing on this platform and hardware DPSCS ensures that all IIs can securely access coursework, virtual classes, and digital libraries.

Orijin is the only vendor that offers a fully proprietary secure laptop system for correctional environments. Unlike other providers, Orijin does not rely on third-party Mobile Device Managers (MDMs) or Wireless Access Points (WAPs). Instead, they have developed a fully proprietary network tunnel that restricts access exclusively to pre-approved websites. This end-to-end proprietary solution eliminates reliance on third-party technologies that can introduce security vulnerabilities. Other vendors depend on external MDM or WAP systems, which are not fully controlled by the provider and may inadvertently allow access to inappropriate or unauthorized content. No other vendor provides an equivalent level of integrated, self-contained technology tailored to correctional use.

The Chromebooks procured through this contract are configured specifically to provide access to secondary education programs in a correctional setting. Orijin removes the Google Operating System (O/S) from each Chromebook and replaces it with Orijin's proprietary Google O/S that was exclusively created in conjunction with Google. This O/S allows incarcerated students to use limited functions of the Google Suite for their courses while blocking full access to the Google Suite. Orijin's unique Google O/S makes each Chromebook secure and safe for a correctional environment and provides protection for both the IIs and the DPSCS. Orijin's O/S is the only O/S that is compatible with the Orijin LMS that is currently in use by DOL across DPSCS facilities.

In addition, these custom Chromebooks are physically more durable and secure than standard Chromebooks available on the open market. The Chromebooks are constructed to be difficult to physically open to prevent hardware tampering and the usage of hardware components as contraband.

DPSCS has determined that the price offered is fair and reasonable for the hardware, licenses, and training to be provided, based on the sale of the same items to other purchasers. Requesting Agency Remarks: The Department of Juvenile Services (DJS) is currently facing an increase in incidents involving concealed non-metallic weapons, narcotics, and improvised items. These safety risks highlight limitations in our current screening protocols, which rely on handheld metal detectors and physical pat-downs. These traditional methods are unable to detect non-metallic or internally concealed contraband and require close physical contact, raising concerns regarding staff workload and PREA compliance.

To address these challenges, the system utilizes advanced millimeter-wave (mmWave) technology to provide continuous, contactless screening. Key features include:

- Avatar-only displays no body imagery of minors. Federal and state law impose heightened privacy protections on minors in custody. The QPS201 generates zero anatomical images, eliminating legal exposure and same-gender screener requirements.
- Non-ionizing, ultra-low-power technology. Minors pass through security checkpoints repeatedly over months or years. Ionizing systems are prohibited for routine minor screening; the QPS201's UWB radio technology carries no repeat-exposure health risk.

- All-material detection. Juvenile facilities face non-metallic contraband that defeats conventional metal detectors. The QPS201 detects plastics, liquids, organics, ceramics, and powders in a single pass.
- Designed for Correctional AI: The QPS201 runs AI-based detection algorithms specifically optimized with prison authorities to lower false alarm rates while catching body-bound contraband.

A thorough market survey was conducted prior to this determination. The security scanner market includes multiple established vendors. Alternative systems were evaluated but failed to meet these combined mandatory requirements. Most alternatives fail to detect non-metallic materials. A price analysis was completed reviewing the sale of the same item to other purchasers. Our research and findings reflect that the proposed price is comparable to the price at which the vendor has sold the same item to another purchaser. To validate pricing, DJS conducted additional market research and reviewed available industry pricing information for millimeter-wave body scanner systems. This research indicated that the cost of acquiring such systems generally ranges from approximately \$200,000 to \$380,000 per unit, depending on several factors. These factors include software functionality and licensing options, system throughput, compliance standards, installation considerations, warranty coverage, and ongoing maintenance and support services. Based on DJS's research, the price has been determined to be fair and reasonable.
